EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH PREVENTIVE HEALTHCARE

The Alliance for Women's Health & Prevention (AWHP) was established with a clear mission: to ensure that all women and girls have access to affordable, high-quality preventive healthcare services. As we reflect on our inaugural year, I am thrilled to lead an organization that is making an impact.

I am honored to work alongside an exceptional team of healthcare providers, patient advocates, health equity leaders, and policy experts who form AWHP's Board of Directors and Advisory Council. These outstanding individuals empower our organization to prioritize diverse perspectives and guidance on the pressing health issues that women currently face.

Preventive health is the foundation of good healthcare, and understanding why women were not fully embracing preventive care was our earliest charge. In collaboration with our partners at Ipsos, we commissioned a survey that revealed a concerning trend: nearly half of American women (45%) are forgoing preventive care services such as check-ups, screenings, and vaccines. The most common reason cited for skipping this critical care is the inability to afford out-of-pocket costs. This is an issue that demands our attention, and AWHP is committed to bridging this gap.

The core principle of our organization is encapsulated in its very name—the "Alliance." Partnership is at the heart of our strategic vision. Its collaborative nature has opened doors to numerous opportunities for strong partnerships with leaders, organizations, and entities equally committed to improving women's health outcomes.

We engaged with more than 70 stakeholders across a variety of issues ranging from breast cancer, to bone health, to equity in data standards to copay assistance and to funding for the USPSTF. AWHP joined 8 coalitions and spearheaded an effort to urge the Biden Administration to safeguard preventive services available without cost-sharing. These services encompass exams and screenings related to cancer, diabetes, heart disease, HIV medications, and dozens of other preventive health services that faced threats in the *Braidwood Management v. Becerra* case.

AWHP has engaged with policymakers on the Hill to join in calling for accessible and culturally competent maternal care, spoken with stakeholders to advocate for simplified vaccine processes for diseases like meningococcal meningitis and COVID-19, and awarded an inaugural grant to the American Society for Clinical Pathology to examine cervical cancer screening in women from diverse populations, to further advance health equity.

We have had the privilege of connecting with influential leaders in healthcare and policy while establishing new relationships with trailblazers driving innovation in screenings, vaccines, and treatments. Together, we have advocated for better and more comprehensive policies, placing health equity at the forefront of their work.

Thank you for collaborating with and supporting our organization. We eagerly anticipate an exciting and transformative second year!



UNDERSTANDING WOMEN'S EXPERIENCES WITH PREVENTIVE HEALTHCARE

At the start of this year, AWHP released findings from a survey of 3,204 women that looked at their experiences with preventive healthcare, the challenges they face accessing it, and the disparities that exist. The Ipsos-commissioned poll revealed that nearly half of American women (45%) are forgoing preventive care services like check-ups, screenings, and vaccines, and citing the inability to afford out-of-pocket costs as the most common reason for skipping this critical care.

Survey highlights disparities in women's experiences accessing preventive healthcare

Tuesday, January 31, 2023 (Washington, DC) — A new Ipsos poll commissioned by the Alliance for Women's Health and Prevention (AWHP) reveals that nearly half of American women (45%) are forgoing preventive

care services like check-ups, screenings, and vaccines, and the inability to afford out-of-pocket costs is the most common reason women cite for skipping this critical care. The survey of 3,204 women looked at women's experiences with preventive healthcare, the challenges they face accessing it and the disparities

POLICY SNAPSHOT: BRAIDWOOD MANAGEMENT v. BECERRA

AWHP led a sign-on letter, endorsed by 22 other leading women's health and patient advocacy organizations, urging the White House to protect preventive care in light of the Braidwood Management v. Becerra decision. The letter urges the Biden administration to consider all available options to thwart the devastating impacts of this ruling, which, if upheld, would put access to critical preventive services in jeopardy for millions of Americans.

FUNDING RESEARCH THAT ALIGNS WITH ADVOCACY GOALS



AWHP awarded its inaugural grant, in the amount of \$730,000, to the American Society for Clinical Pathology (ASCP) to analyze recent trends in cervical cancer screening and detection from a diverse population of women who are currently underrepresented in the data used by the U.S. government to set guidelines for screening.

Through the grant, ASCP will work with a geographically diverse set of clinical sites around the country to look at retrospective data from patients to identify how frequently they receive cervical cancer screenings and review the history of their results to ascertain if there is a higher prevalence of cervical cancer in these diverse communities.

ASCP will utilize its established HIPAA-compliant quality registry, the National Pathology Quality Registry (NPQR), to aggregate, standardize, and study historical data on cervical cancer screening and detection, serving as a trusted central hub. The aggregated data will be analyzed to identify recent trends in cervical cancer and precancer detection rates in diverse populations, as well as other relevant clinical and socioeconomic factors available.




PREVENTION POST
